ramble Bay Bowls Club (BBBC) are excited to announce that it will once more have live music on its Our House stage. To welcome musicians back to the venue, they are putting them up to battle in the Bands by the Bay Challenge.

BBBC entertainment coordinator Myles Banner said the club had been missing the bands each week during COVID-19 restrictions, and wanted to create an event that could get the musicians back out there in the public eye and bring live music back to the club.

"It's good for us to get people back out again and able to listen to live music," Myles said. "We are one of the only live music venues on the Peninsula, and the bands haven't had much work either. I'm glad we can get people back in again as we are struggling. We are not-for-profit, so this is hopefully a win-win for everyone."

This family-friendly event will take place over nine weeks and will involve 24 bands competing in 45-minute gigs over six Saturdays, before the semi-final rounds and final will reveal the champions. "There's over \$6,000 in cash and prizes," Myles said. "First place is \$2,500 plus a paid one-hour support gig worth \$1,000 at the club on New Year's Eve."

One of the bands that has signed up for the competition is the Ankle Smokers. Performing in the first round of heats on 5 September, the band is looking forward to wowing the crowds with their 70s- and 80s-inspired playlist consisting of psychedelic rock-influenced tunes. Lead singer Onyx Pine said the Bands by the Bay Challenge was a fantastic opportunity to bring his band's sound to Redcliffe and expand its fan base.

"We are keen to have some fun and see where this takes us," Onyx said. "This would be a big stepping-stone for us if we win, and hopefully can spread the word about who the Ankle Smokers are. It would be amazing to bring the house down and welcome in the New Year at Bramble Bay Bowls Club."

That burgeoning food scene is just about to get a whole lot bigger, with the planned addition of Centrepoint, set to be a new and exciting food centre in Margate.

Located on the corner of Oxley Avenue and Wighton Street, Centrepoint will add to the area's recent developments, including a new petrol station and business expansion in Wighton, Baynes, and Beaconsfield Streets.

Centrepoint developer Phil Moschella from The Moschella Group said he was confident Centrepoint would be "the number one spot to be seen for food and fun".

RESTORE LOCAL REEFS

S ince Margate local Ocean Wilkins was born just nine years ago, the world's coral population has reduced by more than 72 per cent.

Now, Ocean wants your help to build a new coral reef right on the Peninsula. With a permit to create and install a Biorock® coral reef at Scott's Point, his September planning event aims to get locals involved in the project.

"It's going to be a really fun day," Ocean said. "We'll be providing education as well as several work stations where people can get involved in actually creating some cool things."

The reef will use Biorock technology: a steel frame through which a solar powered electric current is delivered to help coral grow quickly.

"[The frame] can be welded and bent into a variety of shapes and sizes," Ocean said. "I'm really hoping the community will help me design it." Attendees will also have the opportunity to design and create a turtle nest safety barrier to protect sea turtle hatchlings vulnerable to beach erosion, and become involved longerterm to help Ocean collect data necessary for the project's success.

Ecological restoration specialist and guest speaker Dean Philpot said the project had widereaching potential. "When I first saw it, I thought it was exactly the kind of project that should be started on a mass scale, but obviously starting with a few trials like this one," he said. "It's just the right thing to be doing."

Mr Philpot hopes the day will serve as an opportunity for people to reconnect with the bay. "When people come to this event and they realise that such small actions can potentially result in some really incredible outcomes, they'll feel proud of what they've been a part of," he said.

When asked if the event is open to children and adults, Ocean puts it best. "Anyone is welcome," he said. "As long as they've got morals to protect corals."

A WORD FROM OUR REPRESENTATIVES

It's been a big month for the Moreton Bay Regional Council with some great new initiatives. Recently, the council adopted a land buy-back policy for the region, which will secure vital wildlife corridors, proactively identifying and consolidating natural areas and ecosystems.

A list of potential acquisitions is being developed based on defined prioritisation criteria. This list will guide a proactive approach to voluntary acquisition and will safeguard these locations for our environment for the future.

We're also seeing the rollout of new community safety measures with the addition of 18 brand new portable CCTV units being placed across the Moreton Bay Region. This includes multiple units at locations on the Redcliffe Peninsula. The units will rotate through a set of areas identified in partnership with Queensland Police, targeting hooning, vandalism and anti-social behaviour. These units are backed up by the hundreds of fixed CCTV cameras across our network, which police say give law enforcement more tools to prevent and respond to crime, as well as prosecute offenders.

It is good to see new innovative programs being put forward in our ever-growing region.

We know that 2020 has been a difficult year for us all. On behalf of our entire community, thank you to our teachers, teacher aides, school staff, parents and students for your ongoing dedication in ensuring our kids get the best education.

We are finally starting to see the green shoots of economic recovery! The results of the Morrison Government stimulus spending were never going to be instant; the seeds needed to take root in the economy.

Excitingly, the latest

data from the Housing Institute of Australia (HIA) confirms the HomeBuilder programme is achieving its objective of protecting tradies' jobs.

In the two months since June, Australia's major builders have reported that new home sales have increased by 64 per cent over the April-May period, with 42.4 per cent in Queensland. Additionally, the Financial Review reported soaring land sales in July. This is positive news for our third-largest industry - construction. With nearly 10 per cent of all workers employed in construction, we know it forms the backbone of our local economies.

HIA's chief economist Tim Reardon said HomeBuilder had arrested the decline in new home sales and would protect jobs in the sector into 2021. The Master Builders Association is also reporting that in the past four weeks, activity in the housing sector has returned to pre-COVID-19 levels. This development shows this is the most effective stimulus in decades and will help lead us along the path to recovery.

etty 2 Jetty, the longest-running fun run in South-East Queensland, will this year mark its 34th year. Despite a change in date because of COVID-19 restrictions, the event is still expected to draw a crowd.

CEO of Moreton Bay Region Industry and Tourism Shane Newcombe said the event had a rich history on the Redcliffe Peninsula with a great race-day atmosphere.

"The course is just breathtaking," he said. "It's not called Queensland's most scenic fun run for no reason. When you're running along the foreshore as the sun rises, it is truly magical."

The event will once again include 3km, 5km, 10km and half-marathon race events. While there have been several changes to the way the event is being run, Shane said all four race courses would remain the same as last year.

"There will be some changes to fruit and water stations along the course due to COVID-19 restrictions, but the beautiful scenic course everyone knows and loves will be staying the same," he said.

Shane said detailed COVID-Safe measures will be available on the website once the plan is approved. However, if the region was to go back into tighter COVID-19 restrictions, the event will be cancelled, and registrants will receive a refund.

"There will be more toilets, more handwashing stations, a changed layout, line management measures, extra cleaners, contact tracing measures, and staggered race starts," he said.

The popular Healthy Living Expo will still go ahead too, although visitors can expect a scaledback format this year to avoid over-crowding. The full list of vendors is still being finalised.

For anyone considering whether they should take part, Shane said the event catered for all walks of life.

"If you have a passion for running, want to walk for a cause, or feel like going for a pleasant stroll, sign up for Jetty 2 Jetty. What's more, you'll get to experience the beauty of the Redcliffe Peninsula as you complete the course," he said.

All items are chosen to make wholesome and nutritious meals or snacks to help those struggling, such as tinned goods and pastas.

The Pantry is expected to be open permanently from Tuesday-Saturday from 9am-12pm.

magine David Lynch making a Bond movie – then you'd have Tenet. To explain the plot of this film any other way would take more than my 300 word allocation (even if I did understand it all). That being said, this is a great film with director Christopher Nolan's signature all over it; a genre-twisting story, an incredible score, next-level practical effects and most of all, exposition fired in your face like a machine gun.

From start to finish you'll be caught up in a world that you kind of recognise but may struggle to understand, giving you a feeling of unease as you try to decipher the torrent of dialogue, and that's before we even start talking about the use of 'time inversion' and 'entropy'. There's a lot to process, and just when you think you're grasping something, a whole new plot device or random character is introduced. What this film does expertly is reward those who are willing to pay attention. If you can put in the effort, follow along and learn the rules (and maybe have a degree in physics), you'll be gifted with a mind-altering experience.

In true Nolan style there's plenty of 'score porn', with Nolan replacing his go to composer Hans Zimmer with the equally outstanding Ludwig Göransson, although coupled with the thumping sound design, this can make the already tricky dialogue hard to hear.

Another of the director's favourites, Michael Caine, does make the cut, but only in a cameo. Relative newcomer John David Washington is great, however he does occasionally look like he is trying to understand the script. I don't blame him. The rest of the cast are good; Robert Pattinson brings a surprising endearing quality, but I found it hard to warm to Elizabeth Debicki.

Despite this being a very complex movie, I thoroughly enjoyed it, walking out of the cinema wanting to pull apart and piece back together so many elements of the story and its execution. I recommend watching it at the cinema. Take your mates so you can spend hours dissecting it afterwards.

edcliffe musician Vaughan Jones is a man of many talents. When he is not on tour with Troy Cassar-Daley, he can be found on a stand up paddleboard (SUP) off Suttons Beach, playing with the dolphins and taking photographs of his time in the water around the Peninsula.

Growing up with a father who toured Australia with bands before moving to Austin, Texas, for most of his youth, it is no surprise that pianist Vaughan walked away from a scholarship in Marine Biology to join a band and start touring the US straight after high school. He began his music career playing guitar for country bands before becoming selftaught on the keys, and hasn't looked back since.

I played by ear and figured things out on my own," he said. "I related what I already knew from guitar to the keyboard and it all came really quick and naturally."

The keyboard player was introduced to Troy Cassar-Daley in the early 90s after settling into Redcliffe, and had a "veranda jam" at Troy's farm, before he was invited to join the band.

"I have been in his band about 16 years now and I have also toured with Adam Harvey, Guy Sebastian and Jessica Mauboy. I also do recording sessions for people's albums – mostly in the country industry."

In his free time, Vaughan dabbles in photography and has a passion for SUP. His online following has grown to thousands around the world, with fans admiring his unique images from the water. This has led to an ambassadorship with Ride the Tide, a paddle board company whose boards feature in some of Vaughan's pictures.

"I spend a lot of time on the water paddle boarding – especially the last few months," he said. "I average about 100km a week paddling from Suttons Beach to Scarborough each day.

"I have got some dolphin mates now off Suttons Beach and I have been doing some work with Dolphin Research Australia to document the dolphins I find," he said. "They're allowing me to name one of the dolphins I have found in the bay – it hasn't been catalogued here before. I'm going to call him Chuck."



How a Woody Point Homeowner saved the precious memory of an icon.

dorning the length and breadth of a Woody Point homeowner's massive perimeter stone wall is a magnificent colourful seascape depicting an ocean filled with coral and sea creatures. Dolphins and turtles playfully swim in one half of the scenic mural. The other half of the seascape shows an old-fashioned warship sailing at speed, and in the foreground, firmly embedded in the sand, stands a rusting shipwreck. A pelican watches a small boy playing in the foreground, spelling out the name of the ship 'Gayundah' in the sand. The mural is close by the Gayundah Arboretum, which is named for the famous ship, where the now almost disintegrated ship's wreck lies. Thus the image of a ship that help save Queensland from an Imperial Russian invasion in the 1880s has been beautifully immortalised on a Woody Point wall.

The history of this iconic ship is filled with drama, pathos and humour. In 1888 its captain, due to a pay dispute with the government at the time, threatened to blow up Parliament by aiming the ship's guns at the building. Eventually he was arrested and the rest is history.

The mural was commissioned by the owner of the home. Artist Dan Krause of Street Art Concepts, together with fellow artist Steve Falco, created the massive work. "It took us several days to complete the work and we are very proud to have been asked to paint such a historically important subject," Dan said.



Paid Parking For New Hospital Carpark

A new \$23.7 million multi-storey carpark at the Redcliffe Hospital will open this month.

Member for Redcliffe Yvette D'Ath said the State Government was excited to open the carpark on 21 September, as it would increase the current capacity by 50 per cent.

An extra 400 parking spaces have been added, bringing the total to 1100.

"The new car park will be wholly owned and operated by Metro North HHS and the Redcliffe Hospital, enabling the cost of parking to be the lowest in our region," Ms D'Ath said.

The hospital car park will come at a cost for the first time, with a twoweek grace period before spaces begin to be charged on 6 October. There will be concessions for eligible patients, carers and staff.

"In 2017, I promised that the fees would not exceed \$15 per day, and I am happy to announce no one will pay more than \$13 per day, with a guarantee that fees will be frozen until at least December 2023," Ms D'Ath said.

The pricing structure for parking at the hospital is \$3 for 15-60 minutes; \$5 for 1-2 hours; and \$9 for 3-4 hours. The maximum cost for up to 24 hours is \$13.

New Outlook For Swimming Club

he iconic Redcliffe War Memorial Pool is undergoing a facelift, with upgrade works on the Olympic size pool, the learn-to-swim pool and the baby wading pool due to be completed by early September.

The project includes shell cracking injection repairs and repainting, tile grouting and replacement of broken tiles, repair of joints around the concourse and an engineering inspection.

The upgrade was welcome news for the Redcliffe Leagues Swimming Club, which is based there.

Redcliffe Leagues Swimming Club (RLSC) vicepresident Kylie Sturges said the club hosted meets featuring swimmers from all over South-East Queensland who had stated the club ran a really good meet, but the facilities looked old and tired and needed upgrading.

"I think the upgrades will entice people to have a good look at our club as we are one of the few with an undercover 50-metre pool in the state, so this will be a massive drawcard when it comes to training, meets, and those seeking exercise," she said.

"We've also applied for a few grants hoping to get an electronic scoreboard, and if successful, we will be able to not only host more championship meets, but offer this equipment to the local Redcliffe district schools," Kylie said.

RLSC has a rich history, having been founded under legendary Hall of Fame head coach Ken Wood. Olympic swimmers Jessicah Shipper, Geoff Huegill and Leisel Jones all trained under his guidance. The family-orientated club has been going through a rebuilding stage in recent times, and in 2018 appointed Wanda Drew as head coach. Wanda has a stellar record, having coached on the Australian Paralympic team, Australian Open Water World Champ team and World Short Course team.

RLSC Secretary Sarah Smith said the club had gained a lot of momentum under Wanda and ultimately hoped to get back to the Ken Wood heydays.

"It's phenomenal the 'life skills' the kids gain from respecting and listening to the coach and being part of a team camaraderie day in, day out."


"First, the first exhibition at the new Redcliffe Art Gallery, will share the important and continuing contribution that First Nations artists make to Australian art," he said.

Still Fondly Remembered

ustralian history is scattered with stories of people taking on bold new endeavours and leading lives of great service to their communities. Circumstances, tenacity, mettle and generosity of spirit, lead to some extraordinary life stories.

Marle Juster was one such man. Arriving on the Redcliffe Peninsula aged eleven in 1935, he attended Humpybong State School. While still a student he worked in Grants Iceworks and had a paper run to help support his large family. He had a zest for life and adventure, joining the army on his 18th birthday and eventually serving in Dutch New Guinea, The Solomon Islands and New Britain.

Returning from WWII in 1946 he started his first bakery in Margate the following year. Although initially knowing nothing about baking, his business soon became a success.

Over a few decades, he opened five cake shops on the Peninsula and was quickly known not only for his delicious baked goods but also as a man of great character and humour. His trading name was Marle Cake Shops because he said, "I couldn't call them Juster Cake Shop."

Marle loved Redcliffe, and Redcliffe loved Marle. He became involved with the Scouts group, wanting to live his life as an example for others to follow. He mentored youth and gave talks at local schools.

He keenly promoted Redcliffe as a place to visit and live. He was a clever business marketer and was always brewing up new and fun ways to entice the public's custom.

Marle was a foundation member of the Redcliffe Rostrum and Apex Clubs, and active in the Redcliffe Chamber of Commerce. He held various positions in the Pastrycooks Association of Queensland for which his service was acknowledged with a Medal of the Order of Australia.

The Redcliffe Museum recently acquired one of his first pieces of baking equipment - a Planetary Cake Mixer - looking somewhat like a scaled-up old-style Sunbeam Mixmaster. Sturdy and well crafted, it survived years covered in dust before finding this new home.

Sadly passing in January 2017, Marle will long be remembered for his tireless contributions to the community he loved.

LOCAL PROPERTY MARKET REVIEW

Understanding the numbers.

ne of the biggest problems with understanding real estate data is that the numbers are always a little bit dated.



Often by the time the sales data indicates a trend, something quite different could be happening on the ground. Because of this data lag, many market analysts lean towards using auction sales data to deliver figures that are 'today numbers'.

The problem with auction data in our

region is that the auction culture is not large enough to provide a decent enough sample. Not enough homes either go to market or sell under auction conditions to provide a strong market reading. It's very different to certain parts of the country where the auction culture is strong (such as in Sydney and particularly Melbourne).

So how do you get a feel of what is going on now? Is the market going up; is it going down? If you were to listen to the mainstream media, there is a very strong chance you will have the wrong message. I'd suggest you look for indicators such as SOLD signs. How many are around? If there are a lot more sold Signs than for sale signs, this is an indication that the market is on the move. I'm seeing this at the moment.

Personally, I like to also track the number of days between each sale. Over my career, it has averaged around one sale every nine days. If the market is slow it'll stretch to 12 or maybe 13 days between sales, and if it's really strong its around one sale every seven days. In the last 10 weeks I've been averaging around one sale every four days. This means it's currently a hot market. Other things to look for are multiple offers; are agents seeing a lot of them? What about open homes? Are there many people attending and what are you hearing?

For what it's worth, if you are thinking of selling in a 'hotter' market then you have a little bit more leverage in negotiations. If you are buying in a hotter market then its important to be ready. If you need finance, have your pre-approvals in place. Be decisive with your decision-making. If you need to sell before you can buy, consider doing this promptly and get the process underway. 


